LEARNING A LANGUAGE IS LIKE RIDING A BIKE





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And that night I went to bed and i woke up at about three o'clock in the morning and i couldn't breathe which was a very scary experience hey folks how's it going i am very excited to share today's lesson with ollie from i will teach you a language ollie speaks eight languages fluently and in today's lesson you will hear story about how a near-death experience helped him to learn spanish

very very high up and i was with some friends and we had a we'd enjoyed like a really nice steak and a bottle of red wine and at that night i went to bed and i woke up at about three o'clock in the morning and i couldn't breathe which was a very scary experience I don't know if you've ever had this happen very high up in the mountains but it's not it's not nice so i kind of jumped out of bed and um didn't know what to do so i kind of ran outside onto the balcony and i remember standing on this big balcony looking out over this huge valley with a full moon shining light down across the whole valley it was a

very

surreal experience and i couldn't breathe the breath wasn't coming back and i think about two or three minutes pass and i still couldn't breathe i was you know trying to breathe as heavily as i could and i i thought then you know this is it i'm gonna die on top of this mountain um luckily the breath came back and and i was okay in the end but i was very scared from what happened so i sat down outside and i was too scared to go back to bed and so all i had with me to pass the time because we didn't have iphones back then all i had with me was a spanish

book that i'd bought from a local bookshop and it was it was far too difficult for me i remember it was chronic by garcia marquez it was too difficult for me but i didn't have anything else to do so i started reading this book in spanish like plodding through the pages one by one didn't really understand most of it but some bits I could understand but i was too scared to go back to bed so i kept on reading and i must have been reading this book for about three hours or so before i eventually fell asleep all right so now we're going to learn all the most difficult vocabulary and pronunciation from this clip but i

want to let you know that the clips that you're watching today are just an excerpt from my full interview with ollie on the beyond borders talk show you can listen to it for free right now just click the link in the description and now grab a pen and paper and let's get ready to learn so just to start off i think there's quite an interesting story that we had seen so i was wondering if you could tell the audience about your near-death experience you probably are familiar with each of these words when you look at them separately however sometimes in order to improve your vocabulary

you don't need to learn new words but rather learn new ways to combine words you already know in new collocations in the most basic meaning near means a short distance away as in he lives near london in a more advanced use of this word you can use it to mean almost doing something or almost in a particular state you can say the work is near completion or in its adverb form it is nearly done another example is he was near tears as ali said next a near-death experience is one in which you almost die but you don't we usually associate these with a big realization or epiphany and i was traveling up

the north of the country up on the border with bolivia and um it was this beautiful little village up in the mountains called irusha notice how ollie uses the adverb up to describe some actions that happen in the north of the area he's talking about in this case in the country of Argentina here's a similar example we're driving up to san francisco for the conference we use down in the same way they live down south in a small village ali says he was staying in a small town up on the border with bolivia do you know what that means village limit capital and it was very very high up and i was uh with some friends and we

had a we'd enjoyed like a really nice steak and a bottle of red wine and there's a good deal of connected speech in this sentence as you can notice he doesn't fully enunciate each sound in these words simply because it isn't necessary so he reduced and a to anna then bottle of becomes bought to love like a really nice steak and a bottle of red wine and a really nice steak and a bottle of red wine and and that night i went to bed and i woke up at about three o'clock in the morning and i couldn't breathe once again here ollie links and reduces some of his words in this sentence

we have three function words here and so all four words link together there's more reduction in the second part of this utterance he doesn't say this like at about three o'clock in the morning rather he goes and i woke up at about three o'clock in the morning and i couldn't and i woke up at about three o'clock in the morning and i couldn't do you ever feel frustrated when you can't understand natives we don't always speak like you expect us to right like you learned in school that is exactly why we created our fluent with friends course to teach you how natives really speak so

more than one story also notice his use of the preposition onto like into or upon this is a preposition of movement and it's important for meaning let's take the preposition into and think about these two sentences he ran in the house he ran into the house the first sentence means that he ran inside the house the second sentence means that he was outside and he entered the house running looking out over this huge valley with a full moon shining light down across the whole valley if something shines it produces a bright light for example the sun and the moon shine light do you know what we call the light that

comes from the sun it's sunshine you might go down to cornwall which is very beautiful i haven't visited but it's got nice beaches it's very beautiful but you're not guaranteed sunshine or good weather so people will travel to other parts of europe especially for their summer holiday by the beach with lots of sun it was a very surreal experience and i couldn't breathe the breath wasn't coming back surreal refers to a situation or experience that is very strange and difficult to understand like something from a dream example the train ride through the mountains was truly surreal and i i thought then you know this is it

i'm gonna die on top of this mountain uses the expression this is it in relation to the moments before death we also use it to say that an important thing is about to be done here are some examples uh i remember the very understanding of my uh my plane ticket to go to france i felt like maybe this was a little too overly ambitious but i felt like when i bought that ticket i thought this is it i'm fluent in french right now i got it i got my ticket this is the ticket you come to most parts of europe and it's like you know toast with jam or

cookie or a croissant or something like that and you're like this this is it i need i need more i need some protein all i had with me was a spanish book that i bought from a local bookshop and it was it was far too difficult we already saw the basic meaning of near and a more advanced use of that word far is the opposite of near and you can also use it in a more advanced way to emphasize another word as in i ate far too much and now my stomach hurts here's another example and that means

that i

am careful with my money and i spend far less than what i make you know like and i do this by having a budget and you know i record everything that i spent just to live without that right yeah so i started reading this book in Spanish like plodding through the pages one by one if you plod through something you continue to make progress through it with effort at a slow but consistent pace example i'm still plotting through the applications we got but i should get finished soon anyway next day i was walking through the village happy to be alive and i realized that there were all these words that kept popping into my head these spanish words like el obispo

which is not a word that you used that you learn normally in textbooks i mean the the bishop and there were all these words like they're popping into my head oh that's strange because normally when i try to memorize new words it's very difficult I can't remember them for very long but these words were lodged in my head and i realized well it's because i was reading that book last night and so i carried on reading and i finished the book it was difficult for me but it wasn't just enough to understand and then two or three weeks later i went back to buenos aires where i was staying to see my friends

and i realized suddenly i could speak spanish so much more fluently i was speaking in longer sentences i had more vocabulary i could understand what people were saying to me and i realized it was all because i'd started to read this book in Spanish and so all of the kind of study that I'd done before that suddenly came together and and created a complete view of the of the language uh in my mind and so that's how i discovered for myself the power of learning with stories yeah and that's even stuck with you I mean saying like hello that's like a very obscure 20 years later i still remember it yeah that's very crazy anyway next day i was walking

through the village happy to be alive and i realized that there were all these words that kept popping into my head these spanish if you say that something keeps happening it happens many times or continues to happen for example I was reading the chronicles of Narnia in French and they kept saying one word ebay what is fe i don't know that keeps saying it Vanessa is another amazing English teacher and i also had the pleasure to interview her on beyond borders after you finish this video i recommend that you check out the lesson with her where you will get five tips to improve

alid in the description down below ali here says that words kept popping in his head we say this when we start to think about something perfect so does this at all make you think about Justin Timberlake that's the first thing that popped into my head is that that song i was just

gonna

say the same thing i've got it in my head now i'm just like singing it's such a great song and a really great video as well with scarlett johansson i can't remember them for very long but these words were lodged in my head if something is lodged somewhere

it is firmly stuck to lodge

something means to make something become stuck example the poor kid got his head lodged between the rails and i realized well it's because i was reading that book last night and so i carried on reading and i finished the book it was difficult for me but it wasn't just enough to understand carry on is a phrasal verb used to mean to continue doing something it's more common in british english example sorry i interrupted you please carry on and that's even stuck with you i mean saying like hello that's like a very obscure 20 years later i still remember
